WASHBURN COUNTY FAIR BOARD ORGANIZATION

The Washburn County Fairgrounds is county-owned property under the jurisdiction of the Finance Committee of the Washburn County Board of Supervisors. The administration of the Washburn County Fair is delegated to the Washburn County Fair Board.

The duties of the Fair Board include:

1. Renting space to commercial exhibitors.
2. Parking fees/gate fees
3. The Carnival
4. Grandstand entertainment for which admission may be charged.
5. Abiding by State Department of Agriculture rules

This income is used for operating costs, premiums and some building maintenance. The state pays about 50% of the premium money but only when State Standards are met. The Fair operates on a very thin margin and cannot afford to pay many premiums without State support. The Fair Board members receive no salary from fair funds for their efforts in connection with the Fair.



COUNTY FAIR RULES FOR EXHIBITORS

The Fair Board reserves the right to interpret and act upon the rules of this book.

1. Exhibitors in the Junior fair division shall be boys and girls between the grades of K-12 and one year beyond high school who are members of the Washburn County 4-H clubs, FFA, FHA-HERO, FCCLA, Scouting programs, breed groups, Washburn County Junior Livestock Show and Sale or any other recognized youth organization under adult leadership and with an education program approved by the local fair.
2. **Junior exhibitors defined above may exhibit fair entries outside of the projects they are enrolled in. All exhibitors must follow the individual project guidelines and requirements.**
3. Department 35 - Education is open to students in grades K-12 in public, private and home-based schools. This department is for youth who are NOT enrolled in an organized youth group outside of school (i.e., 4-H, FFA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and already exhibit in the Fair through these youth groups.) All work must be done at school under the supervision of a teacher during the current school year.
4. **All exhibits must be the work of the person exhibiting and it must be work done since the last fair.**
5. Youth must be at least 9 years old or have just completed 3rd grade prior to the Fair to exhibit any kind of animal.
6. When grade of exhibitor is specified, it means grade just completed.
7. **Entry Deadlines:** Fair Books and Entry forms are available in early April with an **entry deadline of the last Friday in June for all Junior & Senior animal entries, and July 15, 2011 and July 13, 2012 for all Junior non-animal entries. There are no exceptions to the animal entry deadline; no animal entries will be accepted after this date.** Open class non-animal entries will be accepted through entry day but it is suggested to enter early.
8. In all classes, no exhibitor will be allowed to compete against themselves. **This means you may only enter once per lot number in the same Department and Class.**
9. Entries in Lots with 4 entries or less will not be automatically granted a first, second, third and fourth place.
10. The Judge or Fair Board may elect to disqualify any exhibitor for violation of rules or for neglect of animals (poultry and rabbits are animals, too).
11. Premium checks not cashed by **December 15 of the current year** will not be honored by the Washburn County Fair Board. Premium checks are distributed in late October.
12. All livestock must be shown by the exhibitor unless special permission is granted by the Fair Board.
13. Minors staying overnight must have an exhibit and must have parental permission. Parental permission will consist of a form (provided by the Fair Board) signed by the parent and a member of the Washburn County Fair Association. The Fair Board does not allow exhibitors to stay in the barn overnight. **Parking overnight and camping rules and reservations and fees must be checked with Ella Marie Hills.**
14. Livestock exhibitors will be required to care for their animals for a minimum period of time before the first day of Fair.
 - A. Cattle, dogs, and horses: no less than 4 months or since date of birth, if animal is younger than 4 months, and meets entry requirements.

- B. All other animals: 2 months or since the date of birth, if the animal is younger than 2 months, and meets entry requirements.
15. Rope at least 3/8" in diameter or chain must be used to tie cattle over 6 months of age. Twine is not acceptable. Synthetic rope is undesirable.
 16. All animals must be under control of the exhibitor.
 17. The word purebred, as used in this book, refers to an animal which will reproduce genetically true to its breed. Breed registration papers will be required according to the departmental or class instructions.
 18. **Animal exhibitors must wear clothing appropriate to Washburn County Fair standards. Clothing that is revealing or with obscene language/pictures or with drug, tobacco or alcohol logos or advertising is never allowed.**
 19. Livestock with horns over 2 inches long will not be allowed at the fair except exotic breeds.
 20. Fitting and grooming will be the responsibility of the exhibitor. Assistance of clipping and/or fitting by any immediate family member will be permitted. Also local club and/or project leaders may assist exhibitors of the Washburn County Junior Fair. Junior exhibitors of the Washburn County Junior Fair may assist one another; no other assistance without board approval, professional or nonprofessional, will be permitted. There will be no altering of exhibits internally or externally, excluding clipping of or grooming of hair. Only use of appropriate handling equipment will be permitted by the Washburn County Junior Fair Association at any given time.
 21. General supervision of the grounds and the exhibition is vested in the president who shall have charge of the police and see that order is maintained.
 22. Exhibitors are requested to pay particular attention to their article or animal on exhibition and at the close of the Fair and take charge of the same. The Washburn County Fair will take every precaution for their safekeeping, but will not be held responsible for any damage, accident or theft that may occur. Exhibitors will be held responsible for any damage or accident which may be caused by their entries.
 23. Small animal exhibits must be brought to the fairgrounds on Wednesday evening prior to fair.
 24. All exhibits must be in place by 12:00 noon on Thursday or by judging time if earlier with the exception of Departments 001 (Dairy Cattle) and 015 (Flowers) which are due by 6:00 pm on Thursday.
 25. If an exhibitor is not present for face-to-face judging, exhibit will be marked down one placing. Exhibitors: If you have a conflict with face-to-face judging, please communicate this with the department head AND clerk.
 26. Exhibit check-out is at 5:00 pm on Sunday.

Livestock Exhibitors – Dairy, Beef, Sheep & Swine

In order to make pen & stall assignments a more efficient process, each exhibitor must complete a pen/stall request. This will allow the barn superintendents to be as accurate as possible when assigning pens/stalls, and will ensure that everyone gets a fair amount of space. It is ESSENTIAL that you are accurate with your animal counts- please do not include tack space in your animal counts.

CHAPTER ATCP 160

COUNTY AND DISTRICT FAIRS

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS AND DEFINITIONS

ATCP 160.01 **DEFINITIONS.** As used in this chapter:

- (1) **"Class"** means a grouping in which exhibits may be entered, including an animal breed or age group for animal exhibits; a type of produce, crop or food; or a specific age, age group or educational grade level of exhibitor.
- (2) **"Department"** as it relates to the organizational structure of a fair, means an animal species, production group, or other principal classification of exhibits. As used in any other context, "department" means the State of Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection.
- (3) **"Division"** means one of three exhibitor group classifications for a fair and is limited to junior division, open division and senior citizen division.
- (4) **"Lot" or "lot number"** means the numerical designation assigned by a local fair for a specific category of exhibits within a class.
- (5) **Premium** means a monetary prize that a county or district fair awards to an exhibitor after judging all competing exhibits in the class to which the premium pertains.

ATCP 160.02 **PREMIUM REQUIREMENTS.** (1) **GENERAL.**

- (a) The state aid authorized by s. 93.23(1), States may be paid only on net premiums, which consist of total premiums paid less total entry fees received. The department may withhold state premium aid from any fair which does not enforce the animal health provisions required under ch. Ag 10 for all classes of livestock exhibited at the Fair. State aid will be paid only on premiums actually paid by bank check or draft.
- (b) No deductions may be made from premium money won by an exhibitor. Premiums may, however, be withheld where exhibition rules established by the fair association are violated. A written statement of violation shall be submitted to the department to justify action taken by a local fair.
- (c) Premiums offered shall be definite in amount. No decrease or increase in published premiums may be made because of the financial condition or the organization or for any other reason.
- (d) State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in open division, individual livestock classes, except poultry and rabbits, an no more than one premium in all other classes, including poultry and rabbits.
- (e) No county or district fair may receive state aid for a premium awarded to any exhibitor in the open division if that exhibitor entered the same exhibit in the junior division at the same county or district fair. This paragraph does not apply if the exhibit was entered in the junior division only as part of a herd group, carcass class or performance class.

- (f) No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups, trophy prizes or entertainment contests.

(2) **PREMIUM LISTS.**

- (a) Premiums for which state aid is requested by county and district fairs shall conform with the uniform premium list and other requirements set forth in these rules. Fairs requesting state aid for net premiums shall submit to the department a printed copy of the premium list used at the fair, as required under s. ATCP 160.92(3)(d).
- (b) The officers of each fair shall mail a copy of the premium list to other associations, societies, or boards conducting a fair in Wisconsin upon request.
- (c) Section ATCP 160.01 through ATCP 160.07 and ATCP 160.91 shall be published in premium books used by a fair for which state aid is requested.

(3) **ENTRY FEES.**

- (a) A county or district fair may charge and exhibitor an entry fee. The entry fee may not exceed 10% of the sum of all premiums offered to exhibitors in the same class for which the entry fee is charged. In lieu of an entry fee, a county or district fair may charge stall rents for horses, cattle, sheep, goats, swine, poultry, rabbits or pets. Stall rents shall not exceed \$1.50 per single stall or animal or \$3.00 per box stall for horses; \$1.00 per single stall or animal or \$2.00 per pen for swine, goats, or sheep. A standard pen for swine, goats, or sheep is approximately 64 square feet. Cage rents may not exceed \$0.50 per head for poultry, rabbit or pet exhibits.
- (b) Exhibitors in educational and school departments shall not be required to purchase an exhibitor's ticket. Any other exhibitor may be required, if no entry fee is charged, to purchase an exhibitor's season ticket at a price not to exceed that charged for a non-exhibitor's season ticket.

(4) **SPLIT FAIR DATES.**

- (a) For purposes of this subsection, "split fair dates" occur when a fair organization judges exhibits or contests and pays premiums at more than one time or at more than one location during the calendar year.
- (b) Except as provided under par. (c), the department may not pay state aid for a fair having split dates unless the department gives advance written approval for a split fair. The department may approve split fair dates only if the fair organization justifies the split dates based on extreme hardship. If the department approves split dates, all blue ribbon winners shall repeat their demonstrations or exhibits at the regular fair dates unless the department grants a hardship exemption. An exhibitor may use audio-visual media, still photography or an educational display to repeat a demonstration or exhibit.
- (c) The department may pay state aid for the following exhibits or contests in a fair having split dates,

regardless of whether the department approves those split dates in advance:

1. Clothing revue.
2. Demonstrations
3. Favorite foods revue.
4. Dogs
5. Small animals
6. Rocketry
7. Shooting sports

ATCP 160.03 **EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS.**

A county or district fair shall meet all of the exhibition requirements of this section to be eligible for state premium aid.

- (1) No fair society or other organization sponsoring a county or district fair shall require an exhibitor to become a member of the organization in order to enter an exhibit at the fair, nor shall the sponsoring organization make any deduction from an exhibitor's premium as a donation to the fair society, or require an exhibitor in any other way to make a donation to the society.
- (2) State aid may not be approved for out-of-state exhibits or for separate classes of local and non-local exhibitors. Aid may not be approved for payment of premiums to an exhibitor having an out-of-state address but claiming Wisconsin residency unless the fair secretary provides the department with an affidavit that the exhibitor's residence is geographically located within the state.
- (3) State aid may be paid only on articles or animals actually on display in an exhibit building or actually shown in the show ring on regular fair dates unless approval for split fair dates is obtained under s. ATCP 160.02(4). State aid may not be paid on Dairy Herd Improvement Association records, transportation aid, production contests or other special educational exhibits unless prior approval is obtained under s. ATCP 160.04(8).
- (4) **State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the fair grounds before 4:00 P.M. of the last day of the fair, or such other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior approval of the department.** Authority for earlier removal may be granted by the department in case of meat animal sales or other special classes, if requested before the beginning of the fair. In other hardship cases, approval may be granted by the local fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small animal pet classes may be judged during the regular fair but are not required to remain present during the entire fair. The local fair may prescribe the length of time junior fair exhibitors of horses shall keep their animals on the grounds.

ATCP 160.04 **JUNIOR FAIR DIVISION; GENERAL REQUIREMENTS**

- (1) **ELIGIBILITY.** In the junior fair division, the department may pay state aid on prizes offered to exhibitors who are under 20 years of age on January 1 of the current year. A county or district fair board may establish subgroups within a fair entry class based on the exhibitor's grade level in school. The department may not pay state aid on prizes for club parades, club floats, song contests, or project which is not an exhibit or demonstration at the fair.
- (2) All exhibitors in the junior fair division shall be members of 4-H, FFA, FHA-HERO, Scouting programs, breed groups, Home Schooled, or any other recognized youth

organization under adult leadership and with an education program approved by the local fair.

- (3) Exhibits in the junior fair shall be a result of the exhibitor's own labor and may include a study, merit or other special project, a skill area or a supervised occupational experience in which the exhibitor is regularly enrolled.
- (4) State aid may be used for the payment of not more than one premium awarded an exhibitor under any one premium or lot number in the junior fair division, except when awarded as part of a group in livestock exhibits or in showmanship.
- (5) Premiums in the educational department shall be paid directly to the exhibitor who made the exhibit and not to the school or teacher, except for group premiums offered to interschool competitive classes. No aid may be paid on education department premiums unless a complete list of exhibitors and a complete set of judge's sheets for the education department, similar to those required in other departments, is filed with the department. All educational exhibits shall be displayed at the fair regardless of whether they are judged prior to or at the fair.
- (6) If 16 or more animals, items or articles are entered in any junior fair class, the class may be divided into 2 or more approximately equal groups according to weight, age or other identifying characteristic and each group judged as a class.
- (7) Special educational exhibits may (be) established if the proposal is presented to the Wisconsin Association of Fairs before October 1 of the year preceding its proposed establishment and the exhibit is approved by the department.
- (8) Within any junior fair department under subch. IV, a county or district fair may establish special classes where none are specified under subch. IV. Special classes may include classes for grade and crossbred females in the beef, swine, sheep and horse departments. Premiums for special classes created under this subsection shall be equal to premiums for comparable classes established in the same department under subch. IV.

ATCP 160.05 **OPEN DIVISION; GENERAL REQUIREMENTS.**

- (1) The total maximum premiums set forth for all places in any open division livestock class, excluding poultry and rabbits, may be divided into premiums for a greater number of places, but the maximum premium offered for any additional place shall not be higher than the maximum for last place in the class.
- (2) State aid for premiums awarded for horses in open division classes shall be limited to horses which are owned by the exhibitor.
- (3) All animals in any open division class shall be owned by the exhibitor, except as provided in s. ATCP 160.09.

ATCP 160.06 **SENIOR CITIZENS DIVISION; GENERAL REQUIREMENTS.**

- (1) The age of exhibitors in the senior citizen division is limited to persons 62 years of age or over.
- (2) Exhibitors in the senior citizen division may not enter identical items or articles in both the senior citizen division and in the corresponding classes of the regular open division.

ATCP 160.07 CLASSES; GENERAL REQUIREMENTS.

- (1) Classes may be combined if the number of entries in several single classes is insufficient. If any classes are combined, state aid shall be limited to the maximum total premiums listed for a single class of animals, items or article in that department.
- (2) (a) Except as provided under par. (b), no county or district fair may receive state aid for premiums awarded for sexually intact male dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep goats, swine or horses unless those animals are registered purebreds. Registered purebred status shall be documented by a certificate of registry from the appropriate breed association or society, or by a copy of the application for registration.
(b) Paragraph (a) does not apply to dairy cattle exhibited at a county or district fair if a national breed association certifies that those dairy cattle are recorded in that breed association's qualified herd book which records the genealogy of that breed.
- (3) Any animal entered as part of a group class may also be exhibited in a class for individual animals.
- (4) Boars may not be entered as an exhibit in the swine department unless their tusks have been removed.

ATCP 160.08 CLASS DEFINITIONS; INDIVIDUAL CLASSES.

- (1) **DAIRY CATTLE - Cattle with horns 2" or over may not be exhibited**
 - (a) A spring calf is one born on or after March 1 of the exhibit year.
 - (b) A winter calf is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year.
 - (c) A fall calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
 - (d) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between June 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
 - (e) A spring yearling is one whose date of birth is between March 1 and May 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
 - (f) A winter yearling is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
 - (g) A fall yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.
 - (h) A 2 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year, and shall include senior yearlings which have freshened.
 - (i) A 3 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.
 - (j) A 4 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year.
 - (k) Aged cow - 5 year and older
 - (l) Dry cow - 3 year and older (must have milked 285 days or over in current lactation)

(2) BEEF CATTLE: - Cattle with horns 2" or over may not be exhibited except exotic breeds

- (a) A junior calf is one born on or after January 1 of the exhibit year. The calf shall be at least 4 months old at the time of exhibit.
- (b) A senior calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (c) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between May 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (d) A junior yearling is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and April 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (e) A senior yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.
- (f) A 2 year old or older cow is one born before September 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and which has calved during the past year.

(3) STEERS:

- (a) A senior calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (b) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between May 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year, and which has all milk teeth in place.
- (c) A junior yearling is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and April 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year, and which has all milk teeth solidly in place and shows no nicking at the gums.

(4) SWINE:

- (a) A junior yearling boar or sow is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and June 30 of the preceding exhibit year.
- (b) A senior boar or sow is one whose date of birth is between July 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (c) A senior spring boar or sow pig is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year. A local fair board may subdivide this entry class into January-born and February-born sows or boars.
- (d) A junior spring boar or sow pig is one born during the month of March of the exhibit year.

(5) SHEEP:

- (a) A spring lamb for the Cheviot, Southdown, Shropshire, Columbia or Oxford breeds is one born on or after February 1 of the exhibit year. For all other breeds, a spring lamb is one born on or after December 15 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (b) A fall lamb for the Cheviot, Southdown, Shropshire, Columbia or Oxford breeds is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the preceding exhibit year and January 31 of the exhibit year. For all other breeds, a fall lamb is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 14 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (c) A mature ram or ewe is one born before January 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- (d) A yearling ram or ewe is one born outside the date of birth limitations in par. (a) through (c). The age of yearlings may be subject to verification by a

veterinarian's examination whose findings shall be final.

- (e) A market lamb is one born after January 1 of the exhibit year.
- (6) **GOATS:** Goats may be entered in one of the following individual classes. The age of the animal for determining the appropriate class shall be computed from the opening day of the fair. Male goats and goats with full natural horns may not be entered unless full natural horns are a standard for a specific breed. Does which have freshened shall be shown in the appropriate class under pars. (e) to (h).
 - (a) Junior doe kids; under 4 months of age.
 - (b) Senior doe kid; at least 4 months but under 7 months of age.
 - (c) Junior yearling doe; at least 7 months but under 12 months of age.
 - (d) Senior yearling doe; at least 12 months but under 24 months of age and the doe is not in milk.
 - (e) Yearling milkers; under 2 years of age and in milk.
 - (f) Junior milkers; at least 2 years but under 3 years of age.
 - (g) Mature milkers; at least 3 years but under 5 years of age.
 - (h) Aged milkers; 5 years of age and older.

ATCP 160.09 **CLASS DEFINITIONS; GROUP CLASSES.**

(1) **DAIRY AND BEEF CATTLE**

- (a) A dairy junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull. All of these animals shall be under 2 years of age, and not more than one may be a bull. A beef junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull and are animals in the junior calf, senior calf, and/or summer yearling, bull and heifer classes, with both sexes to be represented.
- (b) A dairy and beef senior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of one sire. All of these animals shall be 2 years of age or over. In either a dairy or beef breed get of sire, the name of the sire shall be designated by the exhibitor. The animals need not be owned by a single exhibitor.
- (c) A produce of dam shall consist of 2 animals of any age or sex which are the produce of one cow.
- (d) A group of 3 best female cattle shall consist of 3 animals of any age which were bred and are owned by the exhibitor.
- (2) **SWINE:** A pen of 3 feeder pigs shall consist of swine of either sex each weighing between 40 and 60 pounds. Any male pigs included in the pen shall be castrated and healed.

(3) **SHEEP:**

- (a) A get of sire shall consist of 4 lambs or yearlings, or both, of either sex, from one sire, which were bred and are owned by the exhibitor.
- (b) An exhibitor's flock shall consist of one yearling or ram lamb, 2 yearling ewes and 2 ewe lambs which are owned by the exhibitor.
- (c) A junior division pair of lambs may include a spring or fall ram and spring or fall ewe lamb owned by the exhibitor.
- (d) A junior division flock shall be comprised of 3 sheep consisting of a yearling or lamb ram, a ewe lamb, and a yearling ewe, all of which are owned by the exhibitor.

(4) **GOATS:**

- (a) An exhibitor's herd shall consist of one doe under one year of age, one yearling doe and one doe 2 years old or older, all of which are owned by the exhibitor.
- (b) A senior get of sire shall consist of 3 does which are the get of one sire, with at least one in milk. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor, but all shall be in the senior age group.
- (c) A junior get of sire shall consist of three does under 2 years of age which have never freshened and are the get of one sire. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor.
- (d) A produce of dam shall consist of 2 does of any age which are the produce of one doe. Both animals shall be owned by the same exhibitor.
- (e) A dam and daughter shall consist of one doe of any age and its dam. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor.

ATCP 160.91 **JUDGING REGULATIONS**

- (1) Judging shall be done at county and district fairs by individuals who are registered with the department and who have knowledge, training or experience in the specific class or classes to be judged as determined by the department. Judging shall be done in accordance with the requirements of s. ATCP 160.92 (3) (a) In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair, nor shall any person interested directly or indirectly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals in that department.
- (2) Each judge at a county or district fair shall be provided with a copy of the fair's premium book or list of entry classes at least 7 days prior to the opening date of the fair.
- (3) No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the class in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of perfection in the class.
- (4)
 - (a) No state aid will be paid on premiums awarded under the Danish system in any classes except in the junior and educational departments.
 - (b) When classes in the Junior and educational departments are judged according to the Danish system, 4 group placings shall be awarded in any class. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the class, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first 2 groups and not more than 6 in the first 3 groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the class, there shall not be more than 25% in the first group, not more than 50% in the first 2 groups, and not more than 75% in the first 3 groups.
 - (c) The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors.
- (5) If any class of exhibits at a county or district fair is judged according to the regular system, the judges for that class may give only one first-place, one second-place, one third-place and one fourth-place award in that class.

WISCONSIN COUNTY, DISTRICT, & STATE FAIRS 2011

ANIMAL HEALTH RULES AND REGULATIONS

SUMMARY

If a fair or livestock exhibition lasts more than 24 hours, the sponsors shall appoint a licensed Veterinarian to conduct a daily inspection of all livestock at the fair or exhibition. The Veterinarian shall review all records and test results required under ATCP 10.87. If a fair or exhibition lasts less than 24 hours, all records or test results required by ATCP 10.87 shall be reviewed by a licensed Veterinarian or by the show chairperson. Records shall include exhibitors name and address, identification of animals exhibited including number, type and description, documentation to show compliance with disease testing and other health requirements, and the livestock premises code, if any, of the premises from which the animals originate.

This is a summary of DATCP animal health requirements for fairs and exhibitions only. These requirements may change due to animal disease emergence in Wisconsin or other states, for example vesicular stomatitis in the western states. It is always advisable to check with the **Division of Animal Health** website for current import requirements when planning to exhibit animals from outside the state of Wisconsin: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Animal_Movement/index.aspx . You may also call 608-224-4874 for the import requirements. **Animals meeting exhibition requirements may not meet all import or movement requirements for other purposes.**

The fair and WDATCP have the right to make such tests and examinations as may be necessary to determine the disease status of any animal exhibited and to exclude or remove any animal afflicted with or suspected of being afflicted with a contagious or infectious disease. If at any time any animal shows evidence of a contagious or infectious disease, it shall be immediately removed from the exhibit and slaughtered or quarantined as directed by the Department.

CATTLE AND BISON

Cattle affected with ringworm, warts, mange or scab may not be exhibited, unless the Veterinarian in charge determines the ringworm lesions or warts are inactive and incapable of transmitting the disease. Any cattle found with ringworm, warts, mange or scab that are active shall be removed from the premises of the fair or exhibition.

Cattle originating from within Wisconsin

There are no test or health document requirements for Wisconsin cattle. However, fair management is responsible for maintaining records of persons who have exhibited at the fair, the livestock premises code, if any, and the identification of animals shown for 5 years. Acceptable forms of animal identification for breeding animals are (1) an official metal eartag, (2) a breed registration number, (3) a breed registration tattoo or (4) other identification approved by the department. For steers, either an official identification as listed for breeding animals or the eartag applied at weigh-in may be used. Entry blanks submitted and signed by exhibitors, including one of the

forms of identification listed above will fulfill the exhibitor requirements.

Cattle originating from outside Wisconsin

A certificate of veterinary inspection shall accompany all cattle documenting animal identification (see above) and all tests or certifications required. Animals must meet normal Wisconsin requirements for interstate movement.

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for cattle originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Cattle_Bison/index.aspx .

Steers are exempt from any brucellosis test requirement.

Cattle from Brucellosis Certified Free herds in Class A states may enter Wisconsin without a prior brucellosis test if the certified herd number and the last test date appear on the certificate of veterinary inspection.

All cattle originating from Modified Accredited Advanced states, or states that Wisconsin treats as MAA because of diagnosed cases of bovine tuberculosis, shall have a negative tuberculosis test within 60 days of import. Call the Division of Animal Health for a current listing of these states.

Cattle imported from states not recognizing Wisconsin's Tuberculosis Free status shall be required to have a negative Tuberculosis test for cattle within 60 days of import. Call the Division of Animal Health for a list of these states or review the department's web site at http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Cattle_Bison/index.aspx .

Cattle originating from Tuberculosis Accredited Free herds (except Michigan) may enter without a prior tuberculosis test if the accredited herd number appears on the certificate.

Cattle originating from Modified Accredited states (Michigan or other states that have areas or zones classified as Modified Accredited) must have a permit number, a certificate of veterinary inspection which includes a statement that cattle will be returning to the state of origin directly after the fair or exhibition, and documentation of the special tuberculosis testing: each animal attending a fair must have a negative individual TB test within 60 days of the date of import, and the herd the animal comes from must have a negative whole-herd TB test (for animals one year and older) within 12 months of the date of import. Exhibitors should contact the Division of Animal Health at 608-224-4874, well in advance of the fair or exhibition, to determine their testing requirements. Animals for exhibition from Modified Accredited states are required to return directly to the state origin after exhibition.

Cattle from Canada may be exhibited in Wisconsin if they meet current federal requirements to cross the international border.

SWINE

Swine originating from within Wisconsin

All swine shall be accompanied by a Wisconsin Intrastate Movement Certificate stating that the herd of origin has been inspected on the farm within 30 days prior to the exhibition and no apparent disease has been present in the herd for the past 30 days. The certificate must also include all required test documentation.

Swine originating from outside Wisconsin

All swine shall originate from a state classified as pseudorabies Stage V and be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection including official identification and a statement that no pseudorabies vaccine has been administered to the swine.

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for swine originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Swine/index.aspx.

If the state of origin is not pseudorabies Stage V, all swine shall have a negative pseudorabies test within 30 days of arrival at the fair or exhibition or originate from a qualified-negative pseudorabies herd that is qualified by testing 7% of the herd each month, or originate from a commercial swine herd in a state classified as Stage IV or V. The date of the last monthly test must be included on the certificate.

SHEEP

Sheep originating from within Wisconsin

Sexually-intact sheep of any age, and all other sheep 12 months of age and older must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Sexually intact sheep exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to attend the fair or exhibition.

Sheep originating from outside Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for sheep originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Sheep_Goats/index.aspx.

All sheep shall be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection. All sheep must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Sheep exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to enter Wisconsin.

GOATS

Goats originating from within Wisconsin

Sexually-intact goats of any age, and all other goats 12 months of age and older, must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Sexually intact goats

exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to attend the fair or exhibition.

Goats originating from outside Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for goats originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Sheep_Goats/index.aspx.

All goats shall be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection. All goats must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Goats exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to enter Wisconsin.

Goats originating from Modified Accredited states (**Michigan**) must have an import permit number, a certificate of veterinary inspection which includes a statement that the goats will be returning to the state of origin directly after the fair or exhibition, and documentation of the special tuberculosis testing: each animal attending a fair or exhibition must have a negative individual TB test within 60 days of the date of import, and the herd the animal comes from must have a negative whole-herd TB test (for animals one year and older) within 12 months of the date of import. Exhibitors should contact the Division of Animal Health at 608-224-4874, well in advance of the fair or exhibition, to determine their testing requirements. Animals for exhibition from Modified Accredited states are required to return directly to the state origin after the fair or exhibition concludes.

EQUINE

Equine animals originating from within Wisconsin

All equine animals shall be accompanied by documentation of a negative EIA test conducted within the current calendar year and which clearly identifies the equine by registration number, lip tattoos or freeze brand, or a complete description of the equine. Documentation must either be an official test report VS 10-11, a USDA-approved electronic test form, a Global Vet Link (GVL) equine infectious anemia test electronic form, or a certificate of veterinary inspection with the negative EIA results listed.

Equine animals originating from outside Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for horses and other equines originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Horses/index.aspx.

All equine animals shall be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) and have been tested negative for equine infectious anemia (EIA) within the current calendar year, i.e., since Jan. 1, 2011. The certificate must clearly identify the equine by a registration number, lip tattoo or freeze brand, or a complete description of the equine. Equines from Minnesota are exempt from the CVI requirement if all of the following apply: 1) Ownership does not change while the animal is in this state; 2) the animal remains in this state for no more than 7 days; and 3) the animal is accompanied by a report of a negative equine infectious anemia test from the current calendar year.

LLAMAS AND EXOTIC RUMINANTS

Llamas, Alpacas, and Exotic Ruminants originating from within Wisconsin

There are no requirements.

Llamas and Alpacas originating from outside Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for llamas and alpacas originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Llamas_Alpacas_Guanacos/index.aspx.

All llamas and Alpacas must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection and have official animal identification.

Exotic Ruminants originating from within Wisconsin

There are no requirements.

Exotic Ruminants originating from outside Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for llamas and alpacas originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Llamas_Alpacas_Guanacos/index.aspx.

Exotic Ruminants are required to have a written import permit, must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, and have official animal identification. A negative Tuberculosis, within 60 days prior to import, and a negative Brucellosis test, within 30 days prior to import, shall be recorded on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection which is faxed to the Division of Animal Health (608-224-4871) prior to the import permit being issued.

POULTRY

Poultry originating from within Wisconsin

All poultry and waterfowl must originate from flocks designated as U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or NPIP Affiliate flock and accompanied by a NPIP certificate or originate from a Wisconsin Tested Flock or Wisconsin Associate Flock and be accompanied by an enrollment certificate provided by the department certifying that they are a Wisconsin Tested Flock or Wisconsin Associate Flock. Sexually mature birds that do not meet these requirements may qualify with documentation of a negative test for pullorum-typhoid (and *Mycoplasma gallisepticum* for turkeys) conducted within 90 days prior to arrival at the exhibition, and be individually identified with a wing band or leg band. Turkeys, except those going directly to slaughter from the show or exhibition, may not be commingled with other poultry. This may be accomplished by separate housing or controlling the air flow or placement and spacing to prevent movement of *M. gallisepticum* from other poultry to the turkeys. The fair veterinarian should make this decision.

Poultry originating from outside Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for poultry originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Poultry/index.aspx.

All poultry and game birds entering Wisconsin must originate from flocks that are enrolled in the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) or an equivalent program in the state of origin. The birds must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection or equivalent and it must state that the poultry and game birds originate from flocks that are classified U.S. pullorum typhoid- clean under NPIP or an equivalent program in the state of origin. Sexually mature birds that do not meet these requirements may qualify with documentation of a negative test for pullorum-typhoid (and *Mycoplasma gallisepticum* for turkeys) conducted within 90 days prior to arrival at the show or exhibition, and be individually identified with a wing band or leg band. Turkeys, except those going directly to slaughter from the show or exhibition, may not be commingled with other poultry. This may be accomplished by separate housing or controlling the air flow or placement and spacing to prevent movement of *M. gallisepticum* from other poultry to the turkeys. The show or exhibition veterinarian should make this decision.

CERVIDAE

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current movement requirements for cervids originating from within Wisconsin and from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animal/Animal_Movement/Deer_EI_k/index.aspx.

Cervidae originating from within Wisconsin

All cervidae must be officially identified, be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection, be enrolled in a CWD monitoring program meeting the requirements of ATCP 10.56 and originate from an accredited TB-free herd, qualified TB-free herd, monitored herd-tested within 90 days of movement, or the farm-raised deer tests negative on two single cervical tuberculin tests conducted 90 to 270 days apart, isolated and the second test within 90 days of the date of movement.

Cervidae originating from outside Wisconsin

All cervidae must have a pre-entry permit number from the department and approved by the State Veterinarian (phone: 608-224-4886), official identification, a certificate of veterinary inspection, and meet Wisconsin requirements for interstate movement (ATCP 10.55).

Cervidae originating from Michigan must have an import permit and require special tuberculosis testing. Exhibitors should contact the Division of Animal Health at 608-224-4886 well in advance of the fair or exhibition to determine their testing requirements.

DOGS AND DOMESTIC CATS

Dogs and cats originating from within Wisconsin (privately-owned)

Dogs over 5 months of age must have proof of current rabies vaccination.

Dogs and cats originating from outside Wisconsin (privately-owned)

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has current import requirements for privately-owned dogs and domestic cats originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animal/Animal_Movement/Household_Pets/index.aspx.

All dogs and domestic cats shall be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection and have proof of a current rabies vaccination. See ATCP 10.80 for specific vaccination information.

OTHER SMALL ANIMALS (RABBITS, GUINEA PIGS, ETC)

Small animals originating from within Wisconsin (privately-owned)

There are no requirements.

Small animals originating from outside Wisconsin (privately-owned)

CIRCUS, RODEO, RACING AND MENAGERIE ANIMALS

Circus/rodeo/racing/menagerie animals originating from within Wisconsin

Animals must meet vaccination and testing requirements for their species. Please see the in-state sections for the appropriate species. Please note: Local jurisdictions may have additional requirement or restrictions.

Circus/rodeo/racing/menagerie animals originating from outside Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Division of Animal Health website has a page on how to import circus, rodeo, and menagerie animals originating from other states: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Circuses_Rodeos/index.aspx.

Except as noted, all shall have a permit from the department. The exceptions are single-species menageries of animals that otherwise do not require an import permit; examples include, but are not limited to, pony rides, racing pigs, and performing dogs. Also, horses owned by individual rodeo participants do not need an import permit. All animals shall be isolated from all non-circus, non-rodeo, and non-menagerie animals at the fair or exhibition. They must meet current import requirements. Phone 608-224-4874 for a permit application. Show and

exhibition managers: Please note that this requirement applies to all animals belonging to midway attractions and rodeos.

ADVISORY FOR HOUSING NON-TRADITIONAL LIVESTOCK AND FOR MANAGEMENT OF OTHER ANIMALS WHILE THE FAIR IS UNDERWAY:

The Department makes the following recommendations, but these are not required by statute or administrative rule:

1. Exotic camelids (llamas, vicuñas, alpacas, and guanacos), other exotic ruminants and cervidae are not housed with domestic cattle.
2. Ratites (ostriches, emus, rheas, and cassowaries) should not be housed with domestic poultry.
3. Small ruminants (especially sheep) should not be housed with domestic cattle.
4. Swine should not be housed with other mammalian species.
5. Since bovine viral diarrhea (BVD), an infectious disease of cattle, can spread rapidly under the conditions of a fair or exhibition, the department strongly recommends that all breeding cattle exhibited at Wisconsin fairs or exhibitions be properly vaccinated against BVD at least 30 days prior to the event. Exhibitors should consult with their veterinarians regarding the proper choice of vaccine and the correct schedule for its administration.
6. Cattle should be tested for negative for BVD-PI by immunoperoxidase test and negative for Johnes disease by the ELISA test.
7. Common watering and feeding troughs should not be used.
8. All vehicles used to transport animals to and from the fair or exhibition, or used at the fair or exhibition, should be cleaned and disinfected prior to and after use for this purpose.
9. All animals found to be afflicted with a contagious or infectious disease must be promptly removed from the premises.
10. Provide hand wash stations near all livestock facilities.
11. All fair or exhibition livestock entry forms should have a space for the Premises Registration Code.

OPEN DIVISION

All Open Division exhibitors must be at least 18 years old.

NO birds will be removed from the building before the set time on Sunday. If you do not know the time of check out, please ask the superintendent. If there is a problem then it needs to be brought up to small animal superintendent. To receive premium checks you need to keep birds watered, fed, and clean at all times.

You may keep food at the fair as long as it is kept in a container with a lid on it. Put your name on the containers. Bring large, flat pan for your ducks. They like sitting in it when it's hot.
